



French Definitions Phonetic Pronunciations

(All Titles Will Be Accented On Final Syllable)

Voyageurs Militaire make no claim to speaking or writing French. In fact, their version of the French language would probably surprise and amaze any Frenchman, if he could understand it at all. It is remarkable how much the French language has been improved and simplified by Voyageurs who have never taken a French lesson in their lives.

Some of the newer Voyageurs, not to mention many of the older ones, may be a bit confused by the various French terms in the Ritual and Manual of Ceremonies of La Societe. Therefore, the following compilation of the "Forty and Eight French" was furnished courtesy of Voyageur Joseph Petron, Voiture Locale 518. Voyageur Petron was well qualified as an authority, not only by his French name, but by the fact is he was an original and charter member of Voiture #1, Philadelphia, and served as Garde-Frein (Brakeman) des Etats Unis, in 1920.

NOTES:

1. In speaking French an "e" at the end of a word makes it feminine; no "e" at the end of a word makes it masculine. Therefore, since a Voiture is considered to be feminine (similar to a ship or plane), it is properly a Grande Voiture, a Grande Promenade, a Grande Cheminot (meeting). However an officer is a Grand Chef de Gare, a Grand Cheminot, Similarly, Voiture Nationale, and Promenade Nationale are correct. And a national officer would be National Aumonier, and National Directeur.
2. Either "de" or "du" may be used; but, based on the above; "de" is considered more correct.

Please remember this was put together a long time ago, but it is very helpful in pronouncing the French words we use today.
